Site Assessment

Introduction

When we began the task of creating the Rutgers Writing Program (WP) web site, our main objective was that it serve as students' first source of information on all aspects of their experience with the WP. Additionally, we included resources for teachers, and we built tools to enable instructors to publish contact and class information on the web site for student use. We are now interested in assessing our progress toward meeting our main objective, understanding how the site is currently used by teachers, and deciding where to go from here.

Student Experience

To get a better idea of students' experience using the WP site, I propose a small-scale usability test in which a student attempts to complete relevant tasks using the site while being observed by test facilitator. I propose a sample size of ten students, randomly chosen from the current class of students who are taking courses in the WP.

I propose the following questionnaire and task list for the site assessment with students:

Are you currently taking a Writing Program class? What is the course and section number?

Have you ever used the Rutgers Writing Program web site? What did you do there?

Have you ever visited your class page? What did you do there?

Using the Writing Program web site, find your class page.

Using the Writing Program web site, find the email address of your teacher and send them a message telling them that you are participating in a test of the Writing Program web site.

Have you ever used email to communicate with your teacher? What was the purpose of your communication?

Has your teacher ever used email to communicate with you? What was the purpose of that communication?

Using the Writing Program web site, find the official grading criteria for a "B" grade in Expos 101.

Using the Writing Program web site, find out how to sign up to for tutoring.

You are unhappy about the instruction you are receiving from your teacher. Using the Writing Program web site, find the name of the appropriate person to contact about your complaint.

You or a friend of yours is a transfer student. Using the Writing Program web site, find out who to contact about transfer credit of equivalent writing classes.

Does the web site seem fast?

What problems have you had trying to use the site?

How do you access the web site? Telephone modem, campus network, cable modem, DSL?
